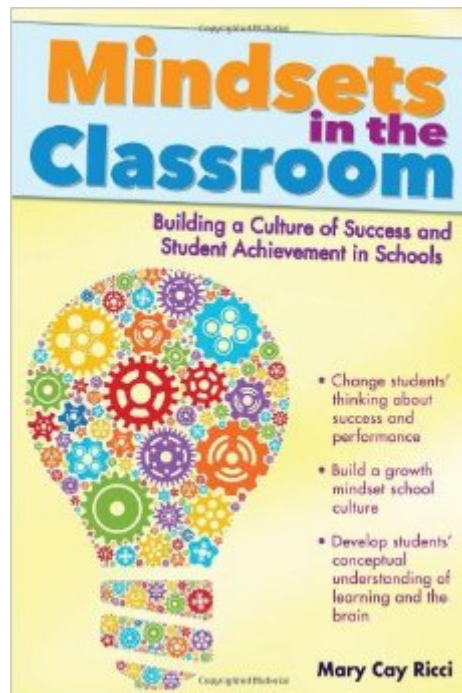

Very disappointing book. I felt like I was reading a poorly written dissertation. The author uses old

habit stereo types about teachers and public education to make her points. While the author's bio suggests that she may have some experience in education I don't think it was recent or for very long. This is a researcher trying to cash in on another's more popular work. I did not gain any new insights that I had not already gained from the original Mindsets book. I would recommend the original Mindsets book and forget about this one.

Linking theory to practice, Mindsets in the Classroom makes accessible to educators and parents alike the importance of student perseverance, effort, and disposition in promoting success in all learners. Mary Cay Ricci examines how hard work and failure contribute to greater achievement when students, parents and educators understand how the mind makes meaning of new information and how well intentioned language may inhibit success. The old adage 'nothing succeeds like success' is translated into language and practices for use in the home and classroom. These are lessons for both school and life beyond the classroom. The resulting improved self-concept and love of learning and challenge have life-long benefits. This book guides teachers, administrators and parents in very practical applications for improving the culture of our homes and classrooms and the language we use in support of students. A very hope-filled and strategy-filled resource.

Although I loved Dweck's book exploring the mind sets theory, I was less enthused with this book. As a teacher I am looking for ways to apply mind sets theories to my own growth and to my students' growth. This book did not offer a clear path to that end and seemed bogged down by educational jargon.

Ms. Ricci's book is an essential tool for promoting and maintaining the growth mindset with all stakeholders in education. Her book provides a clear guide for establishing the growth minded climate in the classroom, design meaningful and productive professional development training, as well as suggestions and models for valuable parent communication. I recommend the text for educators who are looking for a practical and quick guide for establishing and building on this progressive way of thinking.
